Duke University is committed to providing an undergraduate education with a global perspective. All of us live in a world of increasingly interdependent nations and cultures, and you must be prepared to live and work in that global environment. While you can prepare in part through academic study and open debate at your home college, nothing can match direct experience in other parts of the country or the world. Duke offers the following programs in New York and Los Angeles, two of our country's most exciting cities: Duke in New York Arts and Media (fall semester); Duke in New York Financial Markets and Institutions (spring semester); Duke in New York Summer Internships in the City; and Duke in Los Angeles (spring semester). At Duke, global doesn't just mean abroad.

Duke in New York Arts and Media (Fall Semester)

Duke in New York Arts and Media offers a full semester of Duke credit in New York City. Students enroll in two courses on arts and media taught by Duke faculty and guest lecturers, an internship course, and a regular course offering at New York University. Classes meet in the historic Greenwich Village and students live in midtown Manhattan, convenient to major subway and bus lines. Students have facilitated access to museums, Broadway and off-Broadway theater, cinema, and other cultural attractions. The program is open to sophomores, juniors, and seniors of all majors and group size is 20-30 students.

Duke in New York Summer Internships in the City

Duke in New York Summer Internships in the City is an eleven-week program for students looking to intern in NYC and receive course credit. In addition to the internship, students complete a six-week seminar taught by Duke faculty. Students live in NYU housing located in Greenwich Village. Students are taken to weekly events and receive monthly, unlimited-ride Metro cards and a museum pass that allows access to NYC's finest museums. The program is offered every summer and is open to sophomores, juniors and seniors of all majors.



Duke in New York Financial Markets and Institutions (Spring Semester)

Duke in New York Financial Markets and Institutions is a spring semester program for Duke undergraduates that helps students gain a deeper understanding of the financial services industry. Through both coursework and co-curricular activities, students gain first-hand knowledge of the financial services arena and are able to become more familiar with the full scope of career opportunities.

Duke University Marine Lab

The Duke Marine Lab in Beaufort, North Carolina offers undergraduate residential courses in fall, spring, and both summer sessions. Courses are taught by world-renowned faculty from Duke University and other universities and research institutions. Marine Lab courses are experiential; students live alongside the marine environment that they study and insights are often generated by the student rather than conveyed by the instructor. Beaufort Signature Courses, featuring embedded field trips, extend the experiential approach to allow students to develop new knowledge and skills elsewhere in the US or abroad. Duke in Los Angeles

Since 1996, Duke undergraduates have journeyed to Los Angeles in the spring to focus on cinema studies with local experts.
